NORTH ADELAIDE PLAINS WATER.

The Premier and Mines Minister, Mr. Dunstan, warned today there was still a need for extreme care in consumption of North Adelaide Plains water.

Mr. Dunstan said that, because of the wet winter and the very mild spring, usage of water had fallen substantially.

At present the actual consumption was nearly one thousand million gallons below the quota to the end of November.

But with a normal or hot summer ahead and the quota period ending on June 30, 1972, there was still need for extreme care in water consumption.

Mr. Dunstan said that he wished to make it clear to growers that if by careful control of their water usage they were able to achieve a saving on their quota allocations, this would not affect their quotas for subsequent years.

He said that the behaviour of the underground water table was being closely watched in relation to consumption of water and if the basin showed signs of stabilisation or recovery then it would be claimed that the present quotas were achieving their purpose.

However, if the declining levels continued then there would be no alternative but to reduce the quotas for the subsequent period.

He emphasised however, that any new restrictions would be based on the existing quotas not on the amount of water actually consumed.
