The South Australian Government is pressing ahead with its policies to secure properly controlled development for the State.

And we can point to some dramatic successes.

Our overall aim is to get more investment - and so provide more jobs - within a pattern of more diverse and stable development.

New Government-backed agencies have been created to achieve this - such as the Industries Assistance Corporation to help small firms, the Industries Research Institute to provide liaison in industrial and scientific research, and a greatly expanded network of overseas trade and investment representatives.

This has led to a much greater awareness beyond our borders of South Australia's potential and to major multi-million dollar new investments in our economy.

Tourism development is going ahead at a very rapid pace in a number of centres - most notably Adelaide, the Riverland and the Barossa Valley, to provide greater employment, concentrated on women and school leavers, and to increase amenities for visitors and residents.

The magnificent new performing arts complex in Adelaide further enhances the city's established reputation as Australia's festival centre.

Equal priority is being given to ensure that South Australians get the best available social services.

Spending on schools, health, hospital and community welfare services is running at record levels, and we have exciting plans to ensure that we maintain our present pace of development for these essential areas.

The Government's other major concern is to ensure that South Australia grows in such a way that its capital city is not choked, polluted and unworkable.

Central to this is the planning - now well underway - of the new city of Monarto.

The new city, near Murray Bridge, will be I believe, the most imaginative and exciting urban development project since the founding of Canberra.

South Australia has a huge potential. We want to see that it is fulfilled.
